Greetings to you in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ

Over the last couple of days, as I have been thinking about what I should write for this month's newsletter, the weather has taken on a definite autumnal feel. The temperature has dropped by several degrees and the wind has picked up helping the early fall of leaves to blow around the garden. It won't be long before all of the trees take on the vibrant colours of autumn and ready themselves to drop their leaves before entering their dormant stage.

I don't know about you, but I am ready for a dormant stage. The last few months have been strangely exhausting and, for me at least, it is now time for rest. Having been confined to your homes, some of you will have had enough resting and are raring to get going—you can't wait for things to be back to normal—and that's ok.

We read in Genesis that, when God created the world, he established a work/rest balance. He created the world in six days and rested from his labours on the seventh. The fourth commandment (from the ten commandments) states, "Remember that thou keep holy the Sabbath day. Six days shalt thou labour, and do all that thou hast to do; but the seventh day is the Sabbath of the Lord thy God.... For in six days the Lord made heaven and earth, the sea, and all that in them is, and rested the seventh day; wherefore the Lord blessed the seventh day, and hallowed it." (from the Book of Common Prayer)

I would encourage all of you to consider how you might start to embrace the practice of Sabbath in your own life. A day to rest and relax; a day of sitting and reading; a day with the family; a day by yourself. Whatever will give you joy and pleasure, rest and relaxation, that is what you need to practice. Why work just to gain more? After all, as Jesus said, "What good is it for someone to gain the whole world, yet forfeit their soul?" (Mark 8.36) and "Do not work for food that spoils, but for food that endures to eternal life." (John 6.27)

That is why after fourteen years of ordained ministry, I am delighted to have been granted permission by the Bishop of Leicester to take a three-month sabbatical from 1 Jan—31 Mar 2021 (postponed from earlier this year). It will be a time of rest, a time of study, a time to reflect on my past ministry and a time to listen to God's call on my future ministry. I hope it will be a time when I can hear how God would have me lead his Church in this place so that, together, we can be the people he wants us to be and reach out with his love to the communities in which we minister.

The numbers attending Church will be limited because of social distancing measures so it would be helpful if you could email Revd Colin Resch on revcolinresch@icloud.com to let him know which services you would like to attend. In the case of too many people wanting to attend a particular service we may have to introduce a ticketing system to avoid people being turned away at the door.

For your safety and the safety of others, face coverings must be worn by all who are not exempt from doing so. Please be prepared to queue outside the Church until you are shown to a seat (which may not be your usual one). Strict social distancing between households/support bubbles will be in place. And as much as we would want to greet one another with a handshake, warm hug or a kiss, that won't be possible either. Please follow any one way system that is in place in Church and make use of the hand sanitiser at the entrance and exit of the Church. Currently we are not permitted to sing in Church so our services will not include hymns at this time. We are also required to keep the church doors open throughout the services so you might want to dress appropriately. We are not allowed to serve refreshments after the service and that is probably just as well as access to the toilet will not be possible either.

Finally, we would ask you to choose which church you will attend and not switch between different congregations as this will help to reduce the risk of virus transmission. You may think that these measures will spoil your worshipping experience, but we are so looking forward to gathering in a building that has been a place of prayer and spiritual support in the village for so many people over many years. Celebrating the life of our Church

[Secret] Church Part 3

Depending on the Word

How many Bibles do you have in your home?

Bible study is essential to a Secret Church gathering. Sharing and learning from God's Word is vital – even if no Bible is available!

Gideon, a secret Christian from Eritrea, was imprisoned because of his faith. His guards asked him to sign a document agreeing to not read his Bible, not to pray and meet with only one other person at a time. Gideon refused to sign.

He says: "They beat me...until I almost died. I said to myself inside, 'Lord, please forgive them. They don't know what they are doing, but I give you my soul to rest in your hand.' After three months in prison we had a Bible smuggled in. We tore out pages of different books to share among Christians in different cells. I was responsible for co-ordinating distribution. I wrote out more verses on toilet paper - We had no other paper - to share more of God's Word. When government agents searched my cell, they found the verses. They put me under severe torture for months. There was no part of my body without pain. A persecutor asked. 'Why don't you renounce your faith and live a peaceful life?' I replied, 'To me, the Word of God is life.'"

Many secret Christians know God's Word is life. They memorise many passages of scripture because they cannot always have a Bible to read. In the late 1960's in Vietnam (a country still ruled by a strict communist regime) Bibles were very scarce, but demand was high. Before people were given a Bible, they had to learn psalm 119 – all 176 verses!

Across Central Asia Secret Christians are monitored by the state. Converts from Muslim backgrounds, if their faith is discovered, face intense pressure to renounce Jesus.

A Secret Christian from Central Asia Writes: "My life was miserable. I tried to commit suicide. I got to know God through the lives of a Christian family and accepted Jesus. Within one month the emptiness in my life disappeared. I quit all my bad habits: drinking, drug use and violence. I was filled by God's love. I was happy when people started to persecute me because I noticed the same pattern in the Bible. I learned psalm 150. When I was imprisoned and beaten severely, I meditated on this psalm. Despite tremendous pressure I never renounced Christ. God's Word and prison made me stronger."

Choose verses from Psalm 119 or Psalm 150. Write them on toilet paper and memorise them. When you know them by heart, Flush away the paper. When You see toilet paper in shops or in the bathroom, **Pray** For our persecuted brothers and sisters, that they may know strength in the Holy Spirit to withstand their circumstances.

Psalm 119: v11: Your Word have I hid in my heart, that I might not sin against You.

Psalm 150: v2: Praise Him for His acts of power. Praise Him for His surpassing greatness.

Psalm 150: v6: Let everything that has breath Praise the Lord. Praise Him.

Hallowe'en All Hallows Eve

All Hallows (Hallow = honour as holy = a Saint) day is on November 1st. Somewhere in time All Hallows Eve— the evening before All Hallows Day (hereafter called All Saints Day) was hijacked and changed to Hallowe'en. The definition of All Saints Day is - a day to celebrate all saints known and unknown - which had me thinking, what or who is actually a saint?

Then on November 1st, as well as remembering the famous Saints like St. Michael, St. Patrick, St. Christopher and St. Luke let's also remember our 'personal' saints; those who have passed away or those that are still with us. Perhaps light a candle and thank God for that special person too.

But, because I know some of you are going to go out trick or treating, and that some of you are going to decorate your houses with cobwebs and spiders. Why not, when carving your pumpkin, read these bible passages too and see how


Being A Christian Is Like Being a Pumpkin!



[Secret] Church Part 4

<u>Sharing Communion and Lighting a candle for prayer</u>

Many Secret Christians face severe Punishment if they are caught. In many countries in Central Asia Christians and Church buildings are monitored by the state. It is extremely dangerous to be a Christian. You cannot practice your faith openly. In Muslim countries, wine is unavailable because alcohol is forbidden. Secret Christians find other ways to remember Jesus and share communion together.

Sometimes they go to a very public place and share a 'picnic' of crackers and juice. Sometimes they use a grape as wine.

Take a grape and hold it in your hand. Think and pray for those secret Christians facing execution for their faith. Ask God to help you be bolder in sharing your faith with others.

Bite into the grape. As you taste the juice Remember Jesus shedding His blood and dying for us. Thank Him for taking our sin on Himself.

Chew your grape slowly. Remember the body of Jesus broken for you. Pray for secret Christians living in fear, that they may know Jesus with them and be strengthened by the Holy Spirit.

Prayer Candles

In 2016 a group of secret Christians in a country in the Gulf Region were warned that an Islamic extremist group was planning attacks on churches. Despite the risks they met together. Usually they held candles and lit them when they prayed, but no one lit their candle and they sat in darkness. After a while, a six-year-old girl lit her candle and went round the room lighting the candles of others. The adults were afraid the light would be seen, and they would be found out, so they scolded the child, asking fearfully, "What are you doing?" She replied, "Candles remind us that even in the darkness of the tomb there is the hope of Jesus' promise. When Jesus makes a promise, it is like a candle given to us when the lights go out. It is a promise that the lights will come back on again."

It is a promise for all Christians. *Jesus said, "I am the light of the world."* (John 8: v12) Light a candle to remember that, in our darkest times, Jesus is always with us and also with secret Christians whatever their circumstances.

Light a candle and pray for isolated Secret Christians wherever they are.

- For isolated believers struggling to connect with other believers for support and encouragement.
- For those in prison: that they may know Jesus with them and find strength and courage.
- For those dealing with trauma or experiences of violence or loss of loved ones. May they find comfort and peace.
- For those suffering during the coronavirus pandemic from both physical and mental stress.
- For 'Open Doors': For the safety of people working in many ways to support and encourage persecuted Christians.
- For God's church to keep shining His love and light even in the darkest situations.
- For ourselves: that we may be inspired by the example of courageous, persecuted secret Christians to focus on Jesus and live out our faith with greater boldness.


