- 4. What have we gained in this time of lockdown that can now be let go of?

When the disciples witnessed the crucifixion of Jesus, they thought everything was over. It would take them a little while to realise that out of their pain great things will come. There's a lovely verse in the Bible which says, "we know that in all things God works for the good of those who love him" (Ro 8.28). The stories that we share and the answers to the four questions above can help shape our community and the life of our Church as we move to the future. Together we can move forward into the 'new normal' in such a way as will benefit us all.

Re-opening Christ Church & St Peter's Church

We are delighted to be resuming public worship at both St Peter's Church and Christ Church and hope that many of you will want to join us. Initially, this will be a limited return to gathered worship but we hope that in time we will be able to expand the offering. Only time will tell.

The numbers attending Church will be limited because of social distancing measures so it would be helpful if you could email Revd Colin Resch on revcolinresch@icloud.com to let him know which services you would like to attend. In the case of too many people wanting to attend a particular service we may have to introduce a ticketing system to avoid people being turned away at the door.

For your safety and the safety of others, face coverings must be worn by all who are not exempt from doing so. Please be prepared to queue outside the Church until you are shown to a seat (which may not be your usual one). Strict social distancing between households/support bubbles will be in place. And as much as we would want to greet one another with a handshake, warm hug or a kiss, that won't be possible either. Please follow any one way system that is in place in Church and make use of the hand sanitiser at the entrance and exit of the Church. Currently we are not permitted to sing in Church so our services will not include hymns at this time. We are also required to keep the church doors open throughout the services so you might want to dress appropriately. We are not allowed to serve refreshments after the service and that is probably just as well as access to the toilet will not be possible either.

Finally, we would ask you to choose which church you will attend and not switch between different congregations as this will help to reduce the risk of virus transmission. You may think that these measures will spoil your worshipping experience, but we are so looking forward to gathering in a building that has been a place of prayer and spiritual support in the village for so many people over many years. Celebrating the life of our Church

Both Christ Church and St Peter's Church will soon be holding their postponed annual meetings.

In preparation for these meetings, we will be revising the Church Electoral Roll (list of church members/parishioners) and, if you are not already on the roll, forms for membership will be available in the respective Church.

Nomination forms for Churchwarden and PCC membership will also be available in the Church and completed forms can be left in the Church or given to Revd Colin Resch before the start of the meeting.


He didn't bring us this far to leave us. He didn't teach us to swim to let us drown. He didn't build His home in us to move away. He didn't lift us up to let us down.

David & Goliath

[Secret] Church Part 1

How can you be church when you have no building?

How do you worship when you have to be silent?

How can you learn from God's Word when you have no Bible?

How do you pray together when meetings are forbidden?

Lockdown has meant we are experiencing not being able to meet together in a church building. For millions of Christians that is what they experience all the time. They have no church building in which to gather. They cannot worship together or even sing to God above a whisper.

They are the secret church. They meet late at night or early dawn in caves, forests, cellars, under bridges – any where they can be out of sight of the secret police who try to stop their activities and imprison them to make them renounce their faith. Yet they even meet in the prison camp's smelly toilets!

Wherever they meet – they find Jesus there. Even when separated they are not alone. Like them, apart from each other, we can still be Church.

Being a secret Christian means you need to be good at hiding all evidence of your faith. Look around your home. How many signs of your faith can you see? Maybe books, pictures, Bibles, jewellery, fridge magnets or even crosses of all kinds and sizes decorate your home? if anything like these, are found in any secret Christian's home by the secret police, who can force their entry at any time, or by any suspicious unbeliever, they can lead to severe punishment.

Mousa, a teenager from Cameroon, was questioning the extremist Islamic faith he had been brought up in. He was secretly given a Bible. He read it in secret and hid it when he went to bed. But his mother found the Bible. Mousa was woken up by his mother violently beating him and threatening him with dreadful punishment if she ever caught him with a Bible again.

Mousa fled from home, fearing what his family would do to him. He met with the pastor who had originally given him the Bible. They discussed the Bible's teaching. Mousa became a Christian, knowing his choice would separate him from his family and friends.

Question? Would you still choose to follow Jesus Knowing it could mean losing your family, your home, friends, possibly your livelihood?

Islèm, a secret Christian, says, "Jesus is like oxygen. Without oxygen – you cannot breathe. If Jesus were not in my life, I would not be alive."

Question? What does it mean for Jesus to be our oxygen? Are there times we try to 'breathe' without Jesus?

Do we depend on Him as if He were vital to our existence?

Bible Study



[Secret] Church Part 2

Whisper Worship

When secret Christians meet in a home it is often late at night. They draw the curtains, Dim the lights, and lock all the doors. They stay away from windows, often sitting on the floor. They do not want to be seen or interrupted. Christians are spied upon by the authorities or even by their unbelieving neighbours. They may feel lonely and isolated – but Jesus is there with them.

Matthew: 18 v20 "Where two or three come together in my name, I am with them"

Philippians: 4 v6 "Do not be anxious about anything, but in every situation, by prayer and petition with thanksqiving, present your requests to God."

Pray that isolated Christians may know the presence of Jesus with them, no matter what difficulties and persecution they face. May they give their fears, anxieties and concerns to Jesus and be able to focus on His loving care.

North Korea is one of the most dangerous countries in which to be a Christian. The prisons are notorious. People can be imprisoned indefinitely without trial, beaten violently and brutally tortured by prison guards who show no mercy to their victims.

Hae Woo spent a few years in a North Korean prison because of her belief. Despite the brutality of the guards, being kept in darkness, mental and physical torture, pain and severe hunger, she chose to worship God. The only place the guards would not go to harass the prisoners was into the dirty and smelly toilet block! Hae Woo, and sometimes a few other Christian women, would worship in the smelly toilet block. They worshipped in whispers or silently mouthing hymns together to avoid the guards hearing them.

Hae woo says, "Worship and praise are the antidote to discouragement." (Remember Paul and Silas sang hymns in prison)

Hae Woo was at New Wine in the summer of 2018. Her account of her experiences in prison in North Korea was challenging and difficult to listen to but also inspiring. Worship helped them to see beyond the fear, pain and injustice and to focus on Jesus. Worship refreshed them and brought them closer to God.

Question? Do our times of worship mean as much to us? Are we spiritually refreshed? Do we enjoy familiar words and tunes without fully taking their meaning to heart or drawing closer to God? How deep is our worship?

This autumn, the Diocese of Leicester is embarking on a process called *Shaped* by God Together. Over the coming few weeks, invitations will go out to participate in this process which is primarily about sharing learning of the ways in which God has been re-shaping the church.

We've all been learning more about our Everyday Prayer, Everyday Witness and Everyday Action both before and during the pandemic and lockdown, and we have experienced significant changes in how we worship, serve and live together as church communities. The entire diocese will explore this in more depth over the coming months and everyone is invited to share stories, pictures, biblical reflections and social media posts, such that they can be used to generate insights to help future planning.

The stories and insights gathered will feed into a process of discernment about what God is doing in our parishes and across the whole diocese so that we can consider our strategic priorities as a diocese and in particular how we will use the resources God has given us to grow the numbers of disciples, the depth of discipleship and our loving service of the world. Alongside this, we will consider together how we care for our buildings, share financial resources and reshape our models of ministry.

This is a process that may or may not lead to significant change in the way we view the church at parish, diocesan and national level. We will have many stories to tell of God at work in Mountsorrel and it is good that we have been asked to be a part of the ongoing discussion.

We anticipate that much of this wider work of discernment will happen in the Spring of 2021, leading to final decisions at Diocesan Synod in May. As this is a significant and strategic undertaking, Bishop Martyn will also be issuing a diocesan wide call to prayer this Autumn as we consider and discern together the future shape of the diocese.
