Mission Partners

At St Peter's and Christ Church we support a number of different Christian Charities that work in this country and abroad to improve the lives of others and show them God's love and compassion.

Over the next few months I am going to share with you some of the work each of these charities have been undertaking and some ideas of how you can support them in prayer.

This month's charity is:



Open Doors is a Christian charity whose purpose is to strengthen and equip the body of Christ living under or facing restrictions and persecution because of their faith in Jesus Christ.

They work in 60 countries were they supply bibles, train church leaders, provide relief aid, livelihood support and community development projects for hundreds of thousands of persecuted Christians.

In the UK they work to raise awareness of the persecution faced by Christians in other countries and mobilise prayer and support for them.

Open Doors started in 1955 when a young Dutchmen, who later became known as Brother Andrew, discovered the existence of the persecuted church on a visit to Warsaw. Brother Andrew then proceeded to travel through Eastern Europe from then till 1967 delivering scripture, encouraging the persecuted believers and recruiting others to help him in this work.

In 1967 the book God's Smuggler about his work was published and an entire generation caught his vision of supporting the persecuted church. This meant that soon the ministry moved beyond the Soviet Union.

In the years since Brother Andrew's first journey, Open Doors has continued to seek out and strengthen the persecuted church.

One example of their work is their support of a Christian woman "V" in India who had converted from a Hindu background with her husband and sister. One day whilst she & her sister where visiting a local pastor & his wife a group of eight or nine local men broke in and beat them with rods for almost half an hour. Luckily, although injured, they all survived the attack but when they went to the hospital they were refused treatment due to pressure from the attackers. This is where a local Open Doors partner stepped in and took them to a different hospital and paid for their treatment.

Without this intervention, they could have died. Open Doors partners are also able to offer legal support to the women, and provide new stock for Vinita's shop, which was ransacked and vandalised in the attack.

"V's" faith has remained strong through it all and she says "I have never thought of leaving God, because God alone has safeguarded us and helped us.

The Open Doors partners are continuing to help "V" and her family as they have lost their livelihoods during the Covid-19 pandemic and they are still facing persecution from their community. "V" says "Even now they threaten us and say, 'We will not let you stay here.' They say they will drive us out and make us beg.

Prayer is a crucial way in which we can support our persecuted brothers and sisters for Brother Andrew said "Our Prayers can go where we cannot."

Here are some prayer requests for V and other Christians in India:

- For V and the other Christians to heal from their injuries and trauma.
- That the threats against "V" from her community will stop and that she will be strong in her faith.
- That the church in India will not just survive these two crises, (the pandemic and persecution) but become stronger.
- That Open Doors partners in India would be able to reach those most in need of support.

Whatever Looking after our world is an important job, and actually, it's a job that God asks us to do.


We can all do our bit, especially over the summer months, to help look after our world.

Stop and smell the roses

A British summer is full of flowers. We love to see them bloom, bringing spectacular colour and sometimes fragrance into the summer months. It's a lovely time to appreciate the beauty of God's world and think about how God cares for us as part of creation.

Young children are often full of awe and wonder at the beauties of God's creation. With flowers blooming everywhere, it's a great time to visit your local park or green space and look in detail at some of the flowers. Show your child how to gently touch the flowers without damaging them. Talk about what they look like and smell like. I wonder why God made flowers.



Jesus talked about flowers in one of his teachings about worry. "Can any of you," he asked, "by worrying, add a single hour to your life? Look at the lilies in the fields, how they grow: they don't work, yet even the greatest king in all his glory isn't as beautiful as them. So, if God looks after even these plants, which don't last long or do anything, how much more will he look after you?"

As you look at the flowers you can pray together:

(Touching the flower): God, thank you for this (white, red, pink, etc ...) flower. Thank you for making it and loving it. Your love for this flower will never ever go away.

(With your hand on your child's forehead): God, thank you for this (jumpy, silly, sweet, caring, artistic, sporty, etc) child

(With your child's hand on your forehead): God, thank you for this (kind, funny, loving, bonkers, etc) mum/dad.

Thank you for making us and loving us. Your love for us will never ever go away. Help us to take care of each other Just as you take care of every living thing. Amen

Chalking Prayers

Children love the idea of being allowed to draw on pavements and patios so why not turn this fun activity into some prayers?

Lots of shops sell chalks quite cheaply, you may even find some in your local village shop if you don't already have some at home.



In your garden, think about things or people you are thankful for, chalk a picture of them on patio slabs, a path or on the house/garden wall if you don't have a big enough slabbed area. Then say thank you to God for the things or people you have drawn.



Next think about people or places who need help, chalk a picture and then ask God to help them, you might say; 'God please help (name of person or place), please show us if there is something we can do to help, amen.

You might then, want to spend some time sitting quietly as you chalk doodles and pictures onto the

ground. You could ask God if he has anything to say to you whilst you do this. Sometimes, God drops a word or a picture into our head to show or tell us something.

And, if the rain washes your pictures away, don't worry, your prayers haven't been washed away! God has heard your prayers and has them with him.

Finally, if you want to remind people of God's love for them, why not chalk on the pavement outside your house, you could draw a heart and write God loves you, or God bless you for people to read as they pass.
