Treasurer's Report

The PCC has fulfilled its commitment of £16,500 for the 2024 Parish Contribution.

This year General Funds had a deficit of £522.43, Designated Funds a surplus of £278.01 and Restricted Funds a surplus of £582.01. The total balances in hand at the end of the year are: General Funds £3,377.46, Designated Funds £7,499.93 and Restricted Funds £9,234.09.

Compared to last year our Free Will and Service offerings increased by £943.84 and other sundry donations decreased by £186.22

The value of the Bodycote Legacy shares has increased this year by £14,774.20 to £21,8094.03 and the income increased by £757.31 to £5,250.64.

Grants amounting to £157,505.47 were received during the year from the Mountsorrel Church of England Fund to cover the wages and expenses of the Children, Families, Youth & Intergenerational Workers, Cleaning costs, Annual Insurance Premium, August Activities, Muddy Church, New Wine expenses, Photocopier costs, Card Machine, Kitchen Refurbishment, Boiler repairs, Remedial Electrical work & Architect's Fees

Our 2024 accounts show that we are well within our Reserves Policy requirement of holding between three to six months' worth of expenditure in reserve in our general and designated funds.

The full accounts were independently examined by Mrs Helen Harrison FMAAT on 11th March 2025 and presented to and approved by the PCC on Tuesday 1st April 2025.

Churchwarden's Fabric Report

We have enjoyed a second year as your church wardens. We were sworn in at the beginning of June 2024 at separate visitations, due to holidays. Angie at Rothley and me at St. Botolph's in Shepshed.

We have continued to provide pastoral care where it's been needed and/or requested amongst the congregation. Angie has spent almost every week supporting the children and family work and I have used my skills more with the adults and the administrative side of the role. We have both attended church regularly ensuring at least one of us is always present to make sure the church is ready for services and also to take part within the worship. e.g. welcoming, sides person, communion assistance, and readings.

Sunday Services have continued to remain reasonably well attended by an average of 25 to 30 adults and on average 3 under 16's. The numbers seem to vary dependent on the type of service meaning some styles of service seem to be better suited for families. The all age services are a good example of intergenerational worship. The services are in a structured rotation which works well as a good balance.

The collection plate is counted and logged at every service. The collection plate has been low at times, and we would like to remind the congregation that they can give to help the work of their church by using the collection plate or by using the debit card machine at the back of the church. Donations help with generous giving and our parish contribution.

I assisted at the Christ Church and St. Peter school Year 6 event in church to help provide pastoral care by giving the children time and space to talk about their expectations and possible worries about leaving primary school and moving onwards to "Big School". The activity Edmund and I worked together on was about getting the children to be reflective and think about what they have been thankful for at primary school. Some interesting conversations took place, and some led to questions about church.

Angie and I volunteered at the summer activities week in August helping the staff team at different events, which we enjoyed. The activity week brought people into church that see Christ Church as their church but don't necessarily come to regular worship. Taking part in the activities and to serve in some, gave us an opportunity to start conversations and do some evangelism. The community appeared to come together and appreciate what we were doing for them. The activity week placed our church at the heart of the community.

We both attended the Church Warden training day in September, which was very helpful and informative. It's a good opportunity to be educated in what is expected of us but also to meet our counterparts and "network ". Archdeacon Clare was very involved in this training day. Angie and I felt inspired and enthused to carry out our role.

On Remembrance Sunday at Christ Church, we read out the names of the fallen of the second World War from the parish of Christ Church Mountsorrel. A wreath was laid by Trevor (a church member). Later that day at the Royal British Legion Remembrance service at St. Peter's Mountsorrel we assisted the church wardens there and also laid a wreath to represent Christ Church Parish.

Throughout the year we have both assisted Revd. Colin at funerals. We have both taken part in presenting lighted candles to the baptised at the baptism services.

During the year we have attended and contributed at the rota planning meetings and The PCC meetings.

We have been testing the smoke alarms and emergency lighting. Val organised the annual fire extinguisher inspection

We have not been made aware of anything unsafe.

We have countersigned the Parish safeguarding policy. Please familiarise yourself with this. On our church warden training day, we learnt that as churchwardens we are responsible for supporting the safeguarding officer in ensuring all relevant documentation is in place but also that anyone leading or preaching a service must have passed their safeguarding training.

The Church inventory has been completed with only minor changes that regarding the additions in the kitchen and a couple of electrical items.

The mission statistics have been submitted.

The Quinquennial Inspection took place. See separate report about this.

The assistant Church Wardens Veronica and Peter have been a great support and have given their time freely by helping throughout the year.

We would like to give our thanks to Janet for all her hard work with the flower arrangements in Church.

We continue to enjoy working with and co-operating with the priest in charge Revd. Colin.

We also continue to communicate and liaise with our counterparts at St. Peter's as part of being of a united benefice and community.

A big thank you to those in our church that quietly go about serving the Lord by serving in acts of fellowship, prayer and volunteering their time for the benefit of others in the name of the Lord.

2024 Quinquennial Inspection Report

The 2024 Quinquennial inspection Report conclusion was that the church building is in general good condition. It identifies the following that needs doing:

- Slates on Lych-gate
- Verges to be repointed
- Low level repointing to open joints in granite plinth
- Point stone window surrounds, north doorway and adjacent corner to the vestry and the extension.
- Repair shed roof and make safe the walls
- Secure retaining wall to the north path
- Secure retaining walls to north and east sides of the church yard
- Repair/ replace damaged sections of fencing.

Maintenance required:

- Monitor stability of the boundary wall
- Monitor the stability of the leaning grave markers
- Clear the gutters.

Schedule of works completed since the previous QI report were as follows:

- Masonry repairs
- Improved access to the tower
- Painted bell frame
- Replaced the replacement by the east door to the extension

In General:

There are signs of movement and cracks in various parts of the church including the spire.

There is both efflorescence at low level and spelling paint in a few places

The church yard has had a tree come down which was made safe on the same day it fell. Otherwise, the other trees don't seem to be dangerous.

No grave markers appear dangerous. The monument in the northeast corner is missing a rail.

The garden of rest had some work done to it earlier in the summer of 2024 to tidy it up.

We have had a new kitchen fitted with stainless steel fittings, a new vinyl floor and the ceiling and walls have been made good and painted. The new kitchen has made a big difference when we need to provide food as part of our services, as it now has a large Fridge freezer, a dishwasher, a cooker and a moveable hot trolley that can be used anywhere in church. Food and eating together is an opportunity to be with one another in fellowship. When sitting together like this enquiring minds can feel safe to ask questions about Christianity and Jesus. When we provide a meal, we could be giving someone something hot to eat that they may not have otherwise had.

We have begun plans to have a new carpet in the bower room along with decorating the bower room and corridor and toilet areas

[Deanery Synod Report](#)

The Akeley East Deanery Synod met three times in 2024 in different locations around the Deanery. At each of our meetings, Synod members were updated on the Minster Community process, and we received reports on the Diocesan Synod meetings that have taken place. At each meeting we also had the opportunity to hear from an invited guest speaker about their work.

On 7th February we met in St Mary's Church Nanpantan where we heard from Simon Wilson with a presentation about Diocesan Finances. It was good to hear directly from the Diocese about measures being taken to tackle the budget deficit and to have the opportunity to ask questions that are relevant to the parishes in our area.

On 20th June we met at Oaks in Charnwood Church Hall and heard from Elizabeth York, lead chaplain at Loughborough University. She spoke about the nature of chaplaincy work and the joy of working as part of the multi-faith chaplaincy team that supports a community of 20,000 students including 3,500 international students and 4,000

members of university staff. The chaplaincy team are on hand to support people through tough times hosting bereavement cafes and peace cafes, library drop-ins, creative activities and workshops to support mental and spiritual wellbeing.

The final meeting of the year was hosted here in Mountsorrel, at Christ Church, on 8th October. The opening worship was led by Alison White and me. Our speaker was Matt Long, the Youth Engagement and Inter-Generational Communities Enabler for Leicester Diocese. He spoke principally about the listening exercises being undertaken within the Diocese on behalf of the Bishop's Children & Youth Council. These termly listening exercises enable young voices from different settings across the diocese (church groups and school settings) to reflect on a topic (e.g. Poverty) and report on their reflections to the Bishop who then responds back to the groups.

The synod meetings are always good natured and informative. The meetings are open to all (only Synod members will be allowed to vote on Synod business) and I hope you might be able to join us for some of the forthcoming meetings. There will be meetings on 19th June and 7th October. Please have a word with me if you would like more information.

[Safeguarding overview](#)

As you are aware, this has been a difficult year for the world-wide Anglican Communion. The Makin report uncovered the depths of abuse within our church world-wide and these investigations are ongoing. As a church here in Mountsorrel we are encouraging vigilance and transparency to help create a culture that encourages safeguarding concerns or incidents to be raised. We aim to provide support and safeguard victims. Our collective vigilance will help ensure support and help is provided when needed. This requires recognition that safeguarding needs to move away from something that is in some respects external/imposed upon the Church, to something that flows from within the soul of the Church. Safeguarding is at the centre of our faith, in our practice, in our worship, in praying, and in our believing. In other words, safeguarding needs to become integral to the very DNA of the Church rather than an appendage, with good safeguarding behaviours flowing naturally and intuitively.

Requirements

Introduction to Safeguarding Learning and Development Framework 2021

The PCC have adopted and follow the Parish Safeguarding Policy and the Parish Safeguarding Handbook (April 2021) recommended by the Diocese.

Our recruitment processes for staff and volunteers are consistent with Diocesan guidance.

The PCC, Priest -in-charge Revd. Colin Resch, Melanie Rowley (Benefice Safeguarding Officer) and Sarah Resch, deputy Benefice Safeguarding Officer have worked hard to ensure that Christ Church and St. Peter's Churches are safer through regard for policy, safer recruitment and training. The expectation is that all volunteers, PCC members and staff members are safely recruited, have up to date safeguarding training and the correct level of DBS as required.

Your commitment to prioritising and contributing to making St. Peter's a safer church is appreciated.

St Peter's has also worked hard to respond well to any reported concerns, working consistently with the Diocesan Safeguarding Officers. St Peter's has a responsibility to manage and include those who may have been convicted of offences safely and work closely where required, with the Diocese in this. Conversations may include involving the Police and Probation services.

This year, there continues to be a renewed national Church of England commitment to supporting those who have experienced domestic abuse, alongside the recent reports of survivors of abuse within the church and this is an issue that we regard with all seriousness and diligence.

St. Peter's uses the Parish Dashboard, which was comprehensively demonstrated to the PCC members who were present at the last joint PCC meeting.

The dashboard holds the potential to make safeguarding administration easier. It enables people to review the church's commitment to safeguarding online however the reluctance for some members of the PCC to complete any safeguarding training, despite reminders is a cause for concern.

Children and Families' Work

2024 saw some changes for the children and families work in the churches. In September Linda changed her role to become our Intergenerational worker; whilst she continues to be involved with direct children and families work, the scope of what she does is now wider in terms of different age groups she works with and ministers to.

During the spring and summer of 2024, the staff team reviewed and reflected on all that we offer to children and families; this resulted in some changes to our regular activities.

- It was decided to finish Fun@4 due to constantly dwindling numbers, however this enabled a weekly after school group to start – The Gap; this is headed up by Linda so please see her report for more information about this.
- The All Age Holy Communion at St. Peter's also ended with the last service being in July, this service slot has reverted to BCP Holy Communion, and we started Teatime Church on a Sunday afternoon to replace this.
- Some of our weekend activities were swapped around in terms of which week of the month they were held to accommodate the changes we were making.
- We have ensured that there is something accessible for both children and youth at each Sunday service at Christ Church.

Ministry with under 5's and their parents

Sunbeams continue to meet every Monday morning during term-time. It remains a popular group with new families joining us throughout the year. Twelve of our children started school in September, which we thought would impact on the numbers attending but we continue to have up to 30 children and their parents attend most weeks.

Sunbeams is a very friendly and supportive group which supports parents forming friendships, resulting in them establishing a network of people at a similar stage of parenting; this network of support is vital to parents in our mobile society where many do not have family living close by. As leaders and volunteers, we continue to provide pastoral care to many of our families.

We have a lively and engaging story and singing time each week which most of the families and children now join us for enabling us to share the gospel and other stories from the bible.

We ran 2 blocks of sessions of both Beyond the Bump and Starting Rite during 2024. This involves 5 weeks of Beyond the Bump followed by 5 weeks of Starting Rite, most of our mums have chosen to continue on to Starting Rite.

Beyond the Bump is loving service; there is no Christian content, rather it is to support new parents akin to post-natal groups that used to be run by health visitors. We now have involvement from the Peri-natal Mental Health Team who attend the sessions where we talk about mental health. We also have a First Aid for parents training session on each Beyond the Bump course; Garry Scrivens is very kindly doing this for us for only his travel expenses.

Towards the end of Beyond the Bump, we tell the parents about Starting Rite and are very open that there is Christian content at this group, we only had one parent who didn't continue on with Starting Rite in 2024 and this was because she had already signed up to another group on the same day.

The pastoral needs at these groups can be quite substantial and support has regularly continued outside of the group over the year.

Ministry in School

During the first half of 2024, things continued as previously with collective worship led once a week by a team of ministers on a rota basis. After the summer, there were changes made to the school day which affected Collective Worship times and also meant that the whole school had collective worship at the same time 9am, although still split in key stages in two different halls. As the other churches in the village were no longer able to offer ministers for this at the current time, Colin and Alison discussed how we could support this and we now both go into school every Wednesday alternating leading key stage 1 and key stage 2 collective worship between us. This is working really well and it has been a real positive in terms of being in school more often and building relationships with children and staff.

Assembly squad continue to meet on Monday lunchtimes with around 10-12 children attending regularly. They have planned and led several assemblies through the year and also led worship in both our churches. In 2024 some of our assembly squad members led our Palm Sunday joint worship at St. Peter's, our all age worship at Christ Church in September and the Nativity service at St. Peter's. These have all been successful and have brought families into church who wouldn't normally attend.

Prayer Spaces for Year 6 on the theme of Transition took place again in June and was well received by the children who all got involved and enjoyed the various activities and prayers.

The school continue to come into church through the year; the whole school come to Christ Church for Harvest, the Christmas Tree Festival (which includes an act of collective worship for each group), and their Christmas service which was a real joy to hold again in 2024 after a couple of years when this hasn't taken place. The year 6 leavers service also took place at Christ Church where each child was given the Scripture Union 'It's your move' books.

The Remembrance Service was led by year 5 at St. Peter's Church, Kat facilitated this as the 11th was on a Monday.

Year 6 led a beautiful carol service also at St. Peter's, this is always a wonderful service and their singing was outstanding.

It would be great to bring the children into church more often through the year, particularly to support with their RE work and Alison hopes to discuss this with the school for 2025.

Sunday Worship

All Age Worship at Christ Church continues to be held each month with families attending and enjoying these more relaxed services. Linda, Kat and Alison lead these services on different months which gives the advantage of a variety of leadership styles through the year.

Teatime Church started in September at St. Peter's Church; this is a short 30-minute service aimed at families with children followed by a sandwich tea provided by St. Peter's. This has been problematic in terms of very low numbers attending and at the end of the year we had started to review whether it was viable to continue with this service.

Bible Buddies began in April of 2024 at Christ Church; this was in response to families with children regularly attending the morning worship. This took a while to gain momentum but by the end of the year was beginning to take place regularly as children came to this service regularly.

Bible Buddies is on the 1st Sunday of the month, the children are in church until after the activity slot when we move to the Bower Room where we have a story, activities and singing which are more accessible to younger children. We then return to church at or after The Peace.

Importantly this enables parents to focus on and enjoy the reading, sermon and prayers whilst the children learn in a more active and noisy way!

On other Sundays, there are always activities for children at the main service.

Muddy Church

Muddy Church has continued to see variable attendance through the year. Having reviewed the winter season, we decided to not hold Muddy Church in the month of January anymore, mainly due to it being dark so early and very low attendance on the previous January's.

We had some good sessions engaging with different families during the nicer weather and our Summer '24 session brought lots of new families to Muddy Church some of whom have returned to other sessions later in the year!

Unfortunately, we were blighted by fairly extreme weather conditions in the Autumn months; September saw us dash for the safety of the church when it was thundering and lightening overhead, and November and December brought winds of a speed that meant it wasn't safe to be in the orchard, so we again moved into church. Obviously, Muddy Church is not the same inside, but it seemed better to offer something than to simply cancel.

As part of our review of children and families work, Muddy Church was moved to the 4th weekend of the month in its usual Saturday afternoon slot.

Special Services & Events

We had an increase in families attending our Good Friday family worship at St. Peter's this year. We followed the same format as previous years telling the story, making our Easter Garden, singing and joining in a prayer activity. As always, we enjoyed refreshments with hot cross buns afterwards and, it being a fine day, the children enjoyed playing in the garden.

Summer' 24

This was another great week which enabled us to meet children and families who we haven't met before. Mountsorrel by the Sea was particularly successful this year with great weather and a bigger pool for the older children.

For the first time, we held a morning for families with children with special educational needs and disabilities; the Bower room was turned into a quiet sensory room, the party tent was set up outside for sibling activities which staff and volunteers led and supervised, and the main church was used for activities for the children with SEND and their parents.

The families were extremely appreciative of this time, and we met several families with whom we'd had no previous contact. All the families indicated they would love this to become a regular activity.

On reviewing the week, we felt we needed something else aimed specifically at primary school age children, so we aim to include this for 2025.

Christmas

Christmas was, as always, a busy time. Our Nativity at St. Peter's was led by some of the Assembly Squad who did a brilliant job. The service was well attended and as this was held in the Teatime Church slot, we all enjoyed an extra special tea provided by St Peter's.

Our Christingle Service at Christ Church was also very well attended, led by Linda, we had great fun playing pass the parcel before lighting our Christingles later on.

Thank you to Waitrose for the donation of oranges.

A huge thank you to all of our volunteers and all those who pray for us – we couldn't provide the activities we do without your help.

Please continue to pray for staff, volunteers and the families of Mountsorrel in 2025.

Inter-Generational Work

“Intergenerational ministry occurs when a congregation intentionally combines the generations together in mutual serving, sharing, or learning within the core activities of the church in order to live out being the body of Christ to each other and the greater community.”

Our report for this year's AGM will be full of the ways in which our two Churches offer services, activities, study groups, fellowship, support and interaction with all the different age groups within our community. However Inter-generational work is not just about working with different ages but a commitment to work, serve and worship with all ages at the same time.

The Gap

During the first half of 2024 it became clear that Fun@4 was no longer working, so after much thought and prayer we had our last meeting on June 6th. This was not an easy decision, but it did appear that Sunday afternoons were no longer a good time to meet.

During the Summer Kat and I spent time putting together an afterschool group. The Gap started on Wednesday 30th October with a Light Party. I sat there expecting two or three children. We had over 20 along with their parents that first week and have continued to see 20 or thereabouts right up until Christmas.

The Gap is an opportunity to not just tell stories from the Bible but a chance to see how relevant they are to us today.

At the end of each half term, we have a small celebration followed by a cooked meal for all. They might not be all coming to Church on a Sunday, but they are coming to Church to hear God's word and to receive His love.

Many thanks to Mel, Colin and Liz who have fed us and to Dirne who comes along to sit, talk and help the children with their crafts. Our aim is to have some of those attending The Gap help run an All Age service at some point this year.

[Visiting Residential Homes](#)

My links with Rose Cottage have increased, Mel and I go in at least once a month with our guitars to sing with the residents. I go in two or three more times to play games, do crafts or just sit and talk; something that the staff don't always have time for.

I have heard so many stories from the past, about husbands who have died, children and grandchildren that they perhaps no longer see, and I was thrilled to see some of the residents come to the carols amongst the trees service, and something I would like to continue if at all possible – another inter-generational moment.

[Baptism Visiting](#)

Although we only had three baptisms last year, we already have 4 booked for 2025. Mel and I continue to visit each family and organise a Baptism Preparation morning for parents and Godparents. As well as working through the service we encourage everyone to see this as the start of, not just the child's, but their walk in faith. More of our regular congregation members attending baptisms showing support and welcoming the family is a definite way in which you can help with my Inter-generational goal.

Links with both the scouts and guides are slowly building, we have had the Beavers do their Faith Activity badge with our help at Christ Church and a scout and guide service in one of our Churches is a real possibility, probably at Christmas.

[All Age Services/Baby Loss Awareness/Senior Sunday/Muddy Church](#)

Alongside many others in the staff team, I contribute or lead services which appeal to those who are not yet ready for a more formal service.

At some of these services we have noticed that the number of children attending is slowly increasing and that people are now sitting around the tables mixing generations and interacting well with one another.

In 2025

Our winter warmer sessions at St. Peter's did not have many visitors, but I feel quite strongly that those who did really needed a safe space to come to. It also gave the volunteers a chance to get to know each other better. We are hoping to continue, at St. Peter's, with a regular coffee morning.

Jonathan from St. Peter's and I are attending a training by "Care for the Family" in the hope that we can start a Grief Cafe for those who have recently, or in the past, suffered a great loss and I am hoping to visit both the crematorium and a funeral director to get a greater understanding of what happens once someone has died. This will help with my work at Rose Cottage and other residential homes.

Each generation has different things to offer, and my aim is to provide times when everyone from children at Sunbeams to residents at Rose Cottage are able to contribute to and participate in the worship of God together. Our Churches are starting to grow and we are beginning to form strong relationships with families who have little, or no, connection with the Church.... Yet.

Youth Work

This year has seen a review of our youth provision; some groups have come to an end, some have started and others have evolved. The number of young people we have regular contact with has stayed relatively stable and we have seen spiritual and personal growth within this age group.

Youth Hub (LRYFS)

Work with the LRYFS has now come to an end, but we remain in contact with Ant and his team. There were a number of practical issues that resulted in the general youth group closing, and an increased focus on children's and targeted youth work. We were able to support them with the use of the Bower Room which resulted in a family visiting our Muddy Church.

Youth@4

We started the year with a trip to see 'Joseph and the Amazing Technicolour Dreamcoat' at Loughborough Town Hall, which was a great experience and time of fellowship together. Easter saw us turning the Bower Room into an Easter Escape room, and we were joined by a family who we met during the Summer24 activities, the other months saw a mix of drama, games and Lego among its activities. Youth@4 gave our young people a great opportunity to have fun with their faith and learn something about the story of the people of God and how their faith helped them through the difficult times.

During our review, it was decided that, whilst Youth@4 was enjoyed by those that attended, that our resources would be better redirected to encourage younger children in primary school to explore their faith. This would naturally, in time, lead to a greater number of young people within our church community as we 'lay the foundations' before trying to build upon them. The Gap, a weekly after school group for children and their families started in October to facilitate this.

Rawlins Academy

Our Year 7 lunch club, which runs on a Thursday, is aimed at building bridges between the school and church. Each week there are activities around the Christian calendar, or a Christian value and we make use of the table talk resources and have a prayer activity once a half term. We regularly see between 15 and 30, 11 and 12 year olds each week engaging with the activities. There have been some issues around behaviour, but the staff have been very helpful, and I have built up a good relationship with them over the year.

I have tried to encourage a wider engagement with church, and in the summer many of the students designed logos for our Summer'24 activities. As this year group moved up over the summer, some of these students expressed an interest in having a Year 8 group, which I was able to start at the end of October.

The Year 8 group (Friday lunch time) has more of a spiritual focus to it and aims to provide the opportunity for students to creatively reflect on their faith and spirituality. This is a small group of around 12 and during the half term explored the 'Characters of Christmas'. Thinking about what we can learn about the Christmas message through different stories and how we can apply them to our own life. Whilst this has only run for a few weeks, it is hoped it will provide a space to engage with God in a non-threatening way that is open to all faiths and none.

As with last year, I was invited to help with the transition days, offering a taste of lunch club to the Year 6s and leading a team on their team building day. These 2 days are very staff heavy, and the school is very thankful for the support. It also gives me the opportunity to offer some pastoral care for those who are anxious and be a friendly face to our students from Christ Church and St. Peter's School who have met me through the Year 6 Remembrance service, Christmas tree Festival visit, Prayer spaces and other links with the school.

We did, however, have some enquiries about what we did at Christ Church from a couple of young people who attended when we met in the Bower room, and we were able to invite them to Muddy Church. We also had a group from Youth Hub join us for our Youth Movie night during Summer'24 along with Rosie, one of their staff team.

Rooted

We came to the end of our first Rooted Journal which saw us explore the idea of faith being like a journey, being your true self, being thankful and making good decisions. Both Logan and Sarah found the journal helpful, so as a group, we decided to continue on with the Rooted Grow journal.

We now meet monthly to explore discipleship and our youth are encouraged to take responsibility for their own faith exploration with the help of the exercises in their journals. Through these activities and discussions, Sarah expressed an interest in leading a service, which she did in June with the help of a few of our church family. It was interesting to hear everybody's testimony and how they had met with God.

Through Rooted we are seeing our young people grow in their faith and have the confidence to express that faith in their daily lives. Having the opportunity to have some quite deep discussions about the Bible, prayer and our own relationship with God has given all of us the chance to reflect on our own identity as part of the body of Christ.

Sunday Morning Activities and Dig Deeper

Following our review, 2 weeks each month now have a targeted youth activity. The first Sunday of the month we have a table activity at the back of the church which aims to connect our young people with the sermon message. This might be a prayer activity, a craft, or some questions to reflect on.

The 4th Sunday we head into the Bower Room after the first hymn for Dig Deeper. Here we aim to explore the Bible reading for that week, give them some context to

the text and help them to see where it fits into the wider message. As we go into 2025 we hope that this group will teach our youth how to read and navigate their Bibles and how to apply it to their lives.

Summer' 24 Activities

We had 3 events targeted specifically at young people, nerf games at the MMC, a build your own pizza night and a pop-up art gallery at St. Peter's. The nerf games worked well at the MMC, having much more space to run around, and a separate space for family to sit and for refreshments. We had 21 young people attend, many of whom we had had no or little contact with before.

The new kitchen allowed us to offer a build your own pizza night. On the night we had 8 young people and 2 parents making their own pizzas with a variety of toppings. We had some great conversations and were able to catch up with some of those that had been involved in the mid-week chill group last year.

St. Peter's Church was turned into an art gallery for the week with young people contributing pieces which they had made. This was added to over the week with several watercolours from Muddy Church displayed.

Christmas Gallery

Having learnt a lot from the summer, I organised a Christmas Gallery for the first weekend of Advent. We used this space to display the work from Rawlins Year 8 Reflection group as well as others from the community. Our youngest artist, aged only 4, was very proud to have her work on display and brought her entire family to come and see it, with lots of selfies as well!

All of our young artists from school were pleased that their work had been included, with some of them astonished that people would want to see what they had produced and be so positive about it. Quite a few of this group are constantly getting into trouble at school, and struggle with education. Having their work displayed meant a great deal to them and as a result, I have seen them be encouraged and valued as people.

Prayers for 2025

- Relationships with school will continue to grow and that students will take pride in their achievements and be inspired to reach their full potential.

- That our young people will continue to grow in faith and be equipped and inspired by the Spirit.
- That our new groups will draw others into the church as they seek to learn about Jesus.
